ESTABLISHING THE KPUAA ENDOWMENT FOR STUDENTS IN NEED

The KPU Alumni Association played a lead role in the inaugural KPU Foundation Giving Tuesday campaign to raise much-needed funds to support students at Kwantlen Polytechnic University (KPU).

The KPUAA committed to match donations from KPU alumni during Giving Tuesday on December 1st and embraced this opportunity to establish the KPU Alumni Association Endowment for bursaries, community-service awards and scholarships.

The board of directors has pledged an additional \$25,000 over the next five years to continue to build the endowment, introducing a growing number of annual student awards at KPU. With KPU alumni also

personally contributing to the fund, the endowment will quickly become one of the largest student award endowments held by the KPU Foundation.

As Challenge Champion, the association contributed \$25,000 in matching dollars on Giving Tuesday, and with alumni matching this commitment, launched their signature fund pledging an additional \$5,000 annually for five years for a total gift of \$50,000.

In 2020 at the start of the global pandemic the KPUAA wanted to give back to students in need. They donated \$2,500 to the student emergency bursary fund.







Since 2007 the KPU Alumni Association has been recognizing exceptional KPU alumni who have demonstrated excellence through their achievements.

Consideration for these awards is given to individuals who have enhanced the reputation of the university through their outstanding professional, business or industry endeavours; public, community and/or volunteer service.

After learning her craft at Kwantlen Polytechnic University, journalist Andrea Woo has reported on some of the most important issues in Canada in recent years. Now the award-winning journalist has been awarded the 2020 KPU Distinguished Alumni Award.

"I'm incredibly grateful for this acknowledgment from my alma mater," says Woo. "It also served as a lovely reminder of how I got my start, and the very first days of what would eventually become a dream career."

Woo was 17 when she started at KPU in the journalism program. She says she didn't know what she wanted to do other than something that involved writing.

"It was KPU that taught me what journalism was, what it could do, and that there was a space in it for me. I learned not just journalism basics but critical thinking and analysis, all while being supported by warm and friendly instructors who were generous with their time."

In 2003, while she was writing for KPU's former student newspaper, the Chronicle, she wrote a story on the opening of North America's first legal supervised injection site, Insite.

"People sat with me on the stoop, telling me about their lives. Some of their stories were heartbreaking," says Woo. "I remember being fascinated with everything that I learned that day and feeling excited to put that story together."

Today, Woo has won several journalism awards and is known for her reporting on Canada's fentanyl crisis, which won her a 2017 Canadian Association of Journalists award. As a reporter for the Globe and Mail, she focuses mainly on substance abuse, mental health, and drug policy.

Woo graduated from KPU in 2006 with a Bachelor of Arts in Applied Journalism. She went on to write for Canadian and America music publications about hip-hop. In 2012, she was hired by the Globe and Mail.

Journalism instructor Beverly Wake nominated Woo for the Distinguished Alumni Award.

"Andrea is an extremely talented journalist. She's an exceptional reporter, not only in her ability to dig through material but in her ability to relate to people from all walks of life and to get them to trust her enough to share their stories," she says.

"Andrea Woo has made KPU proud as she started her amazing journey into the world of journalism here," says Dr. Alan Davis, KPU president and vice-chancellor.

The Outstanding Young Alumni award recognizes a KPU alumni who is under 30 years of age at the time of nomination and who has demonstrated excellence professionally or through community service, while maintaining continued involvement with KPU. We are very pleased to be recognizing Ayesha Khan as the recipient of the 2020 award.

In the words of her nominator Deanna Fasciani "One can judge a leader not by how many they lead but by how they make leaders of others. Ayesha has never put herself before the cause, the cause of making her world, our world, more just and more compassionate than the state in which she inherited it."

To this end Ayesha has embarked on relentless study, and is embedded in community participation, personal sacrifice, tireless public service, and compassion towards society's most vulnerable and marginalized groups and individuals.

While still a university student, Ayesha has committed herself to non-profit leadership and then to formal labour organizing in one of North America's largest trade unions, SEIU, and is currently with the BC General Employees' Union. All while throwing herself into community service including Human Concern International, the Syrian Kids Foundation, the United Nations Association in Canada and the Kwantlen Public Interest Research Group to name a few. Ayesha was also recognized by The World Economic Forum as a Global Shaper, and as a delegate for the 2020 Banff Forum - which brings together leaders across sectors and regions that enhance life for all who live in Canada.

The KPU Alumni Association was thrilled to confer the 2020 Outstanding Young Alumni Award on Ayesha Khan. Ayesha is an inspiration to all who, by circumstance, face incredible odds; demonstrating the hard work that goes into building a better future.
